NAIDOC Week

National NAIDOC Week celebrations are held across Australia in the first week of July each year (Sunday to Sunday), to celebrate and recognise the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. NAIDOC Week is an opportunity for all Australians to learn about First Nations cultures and histories and participate in celebrations of the oldest, continuous living cultures on earth. You can support and get to know your local Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander communities through activities and events held across the country. This year's National NAIDOC Week marks 50 years of the week-long celebrations, and the theme, The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy, celebrates achievements of the past and the bright future ahead. At Hornsby Heights Public School, we are excited to celebrate NAIDOC Week with a range of engaging activities planned by each Stage. We encourage families to refer to the flyers included later in the Newsletter for more details on the activities and events happening in each class.

Stage 3 Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) being phased out.

2026 Year 5 and 6 parents recently received a note via School Bytes regarding the school's plan to phase out the Stage 3 BYOD program. With the support of the P&C, the school is making a significant investment in the purchase of new Chromebooks for use in Stage 3 classrooms. As part of this transition, we are phasing out the current Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) program.

This means that students going into Year 5 next year will not be asked to purchase their own device as the school will supply them. Students going into Year 6 next year have the option of either using their own device (like this year) or using the school's devices.

We are confident that this change will support a more consistent and equitable digital learning environment for all students. Thank you for your continued support as we implement this change. We thank the P&C for their generous donation to the school in order to start this process.

New School Reports

Reports were sent out on Monday this week via School Bytes. The new format has been developed by the NSW Department of Education in response to feedback from parents and educators to make reports easier to read and understand. Your child's report will still show their progress across all subject areas. Teacher comments in the form of student strengths and learning goals will appear in English and mathematics, and a comment will be given for the general comment section, in line with department policy. The general comment for Kindergarten also covers all other key learning areas including, creative arts, HSIE, PDHPE, and science and technology. A new achievement scale and descriptions are included to provide a clearer picture of your child's progress eg changing the word "sound" to "expected".

Fostering a Supportive School Community

As we continue to foster a supportive and collaborative environment for our children. I want to gently remind everyone of the importance of addressing school matters directly with us, rather than discussing them with other parents. While we appreciate your passion and care for our school community, it's essential that we work together through the proper channels to ensure that every concern is handled appropriately and effectively. Please remember that no parent is to approach another child at school. Concerns should always be directed to the classroom teacher. We have the context and resources to address issues in the best way possible. Your partnership is invaluable, and by communicating openly, we can create the best possible experience for our students.


School Uniform- Sock Blitz


in Kindy

We will link this learning to what we have been working on throughout the Term when learning about our First Nations people.




The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy

NAIDOC WEEK STAGE 2 - 2025


As we acknowledge NAIDOC week, we will reflect on the importance of storytelling as a way to preserve Culture and ensure an enduring legacy for future generations.





Bushfires

Bushfires are an unplanned vegetation fire. They destroy anything in their path, including environments, animals, biomes and vegetation. There are about 45 000-60 000 bushfires a year, which kills billions of plants and animals. Did you know that a fire doubles every 30 seconds- which means that in eight minutes a fire can multiply by 64?



Due to fires, tens of millions to hundreds of millions of acres are burnt annually. In the 2019-2020 fires 59 million acres were burned- which killed billions of animals.

The worst affected were koalas, as over 6 382 koalas perished, which represents 15% of the population. This is also extremely bad for the environment, as it can destroy precious ecosystems and reduce soil's capacity to hold water. Bushfires also release a gas called carbon dioxide into the atmosphere.

Although some fires are natural, a stunning 85% of fires are lit by humans. But what do we do to stop it?




Global warming is when the global annual temperature rises. It is caused when carbon dioxide finds its way into the atmosphere, which traps heat and allows the temperatures to rise rapidly. Global warming creates dryer temperatures, resulting in more frequent bushfires.

How we can help?

To prevent fires, backburning is a great way! While it doesn't prevent all fires, it can stop the spread and reduce the intensity and impact. It also creates firebreaks- breaks that the fire cannot cross.



Remember, you can help stop fires- but first, what are you going to do?



We can help stop fires in little ways-things like maintaining fires responsibly, can help make a MASSIVE difference. Here are some ideas that you can use to help out: carefully disposing of smoking materials, not allowing sparks to fall on dry grass, landscape for firesistance, he grare of the weather and win and many more!

When I say poaching, I am not referring to eggs! Poaching is the illegal killing, capturing, or harvesting of plants and animals for illegal trade. This is causing biodiversity loss, disruption of the food. chain, and the destruction of habitats.


This graph shows improvements are being made and are reducing the number of pangolins that are being hunted and traded. But poaching is still a big problem.

But more efforts need to be made to stop the threat of poaching. Creating stricter laws, forbidding illegal hunting and harvesting. More protected areas like national parks can protect our wildlife, providing sae havens for animals. Try to use sustainable products, not made from endangered species. And don't pull out native plants to make way or your garden, as this can lead to a spread in invasive plant species.

The most poached animal in the world is the pangolin, the only scaly mammal. It's like a scaly anteater and is hunted for its meat and scales. It's meat is considered a delicacy in parts of a Asia, and its scales are used in many traditional medicines. Even though all eight species are protected, they are still heavily hunted.

Poaching is serious problem and it needs to stop! It's destroying our planet. Our wildlife is dying, because of us! Help us protect our planet. Even the smallest efforts are a step toward saving Earth!




Air Pollution





FACTSHEET

No knives at school – parent factsheet

Health and Safety Directorate



There is no good reason to bring a knife to school.

NSW now has the toughest knife laws in Australia. As a parent, you need to be aware of these laws, as you can also be charged if you allow your child to carry a knife.

No knives allowed at school under any circumstances

If a student has a knife at school the principal may call the police.

The student may be expelled or suspended immediately. Possessing a knife includes your child simply having one in their bag or locker. Having a knife for self-protection is also illegal. If you are concerned about your child's wellbeing or safety, contact the principal.

Tough penalties apply for children convicted of knife offences, including gaol sentences of up to 25 years if someone is injured with a knife during an assault.

Every child has the right to feel safe and secure at school. There is no good reason for a child to ever have a knife at school.

If you want to talk about children and knives at school, please contact the principal.

What kind of knives are prohibited?

As school policy is designed to keep all students safe, no type of knife is allowed at school. That means no butter knives or fruit knives in lunchboxes, or knife tools for craft purposes.

Flick knives, ballistic knives, sheath knives, push daggers, trench knives, butterfly knives and star knives are all prohibited.

Your child cannot bring to school any item that can be used as a weapon (such as a chisel).

In lessons requiring the use of knives, for example cooking or trades, your child's teacher will supply and supervise the use of the tools. There are some senior subjects, such as hospitality, where children may be required to have their own knives.

Your child's school will advise you about these courses and the procedures for carrying knives legally to and from school.

The law makes parents responsible

You need to make certain your child is aware of the school's rules and the State laws about knives.

If you allow your child to carry or possess a knife at school or in a public place, you can be charged.

The police can search any child they suspect of having a knife. They can confiscate any dangerous object they might find during the search.

Your child must comply with such a police search, or they may be arrested and charged.

It is also illegal for anyone to sell a knife to anyone who is less than 16 years old

GROWING STRONGER TOGETHER: HOW OUR TEACHERS SUPPORT STUDENT SUCCESS

Supporting every student to thrive starts with excellent teaching. This year, our focus continues to be on strengthening our Explicit teaching strategies through the use of effective feedback, vocabulary development, and reflective teaching, aligned with educational research.

Feedback That Moves Learning Forward

Another key focus is improving the quality of feedback students receive, with teachers refining and enhancing their practices to ensure feedback is clearly aligned with each lesson's Learning Intentions and Success Criteria. This supports students in understanding how they're progressing and what steps they need to take next.

Recently, staff have engaged in professional earning to strengthen how we give feedback. We have been trying new approaches and working together to help students reflect on their progress, build confidence, and develop a positive attitude towards learning.





Vocabulary Development: Powering Up Student Writing

With students at the core of everything we do, our continued focus is on clear and effective teaching, strengthening vocabulary, and providing meaningful feedback that helps students grow. Our teachers are continuing to build on what's working—refining these key areas to support every child's confidence, skills, and understanding throughout their learning journey.

What Does This Look Like?

- Teachers explain exactly what your child will learn and why it matters.
- They provide clear examples and guide students step-by-step until they are ready to work independently.
- Students develop their vocabulary through a structured, tiered program that introduces and reinforces words at different levels of complexity.
- Feedback is directly linked to lesson goals, so your child knows what they
 are doing well and what to improve. For instance, a teacher might say,
 "Great use of descriptive words in your writing—even better if you add
 more vivid details to paint a clearer picture for the reader." This clear
 teaching and targeted feedback help students understand their learning
 and take ownership of their progress.

Working Together

Partnership with families is vital. Your support at home—encouraging reading, discussing new words, and talking about learning—plays a key role in reinforcing school learning.

We celebrate the growth we see in students every day and are proud of our teachers' commitment to ongoing learning and improvement.

Together, we are building confident, capable learners equipped with the skills, vocabulary, and mindset to succeed—today and into the future.

Parent/Carer Tips:

- Talk about new words: When your child learns a new word, encourage them to use it in a sentence or story.
- Read together daily: Choose books that interest your child and discuss interesting words or ideas.
- Ask about school learning: Find out what your child is learning and the feedback they've received.
- Play word games: Simple games like 'I spy' with sounds or meanings make learning fun.
- Use real-life examples: Point out new words in signs, menus, or conversations when you're out and about.
- When visiting a zoo, beach, or park, introduce words related to the setting."This place is very serene—that means calm and peaceful."
- Multi-sensory learning supports deeper understanding. Have your child draw a picture of a new word and write a simple sentence with it. Example: Word: "Enormous." Picture: Giant dinosaur. Sentence: "The dinosaur was enormous."
